Decision and Order Affirming the
County Board of Equalization

Background

1. The Subject Property is a 1,529 sq. ft. ranch style home, with a legal description of: Lot 69 Southwind Two, Sarpy County, NE.
2. The Sarpy County Assessor (the County Assessor) assessed the Subject Property at \$227,821 for tax year 2015.
3. The Taxpayer protested this value to the Sarpy County Board of Equalization (the County Board) and requested an assessed value of \$200,000 for tax year 2015.
4. The County Board determined that the taxable value of the Subject Property was \$227,821 for tax year 2015.
5. The Taxpayer appealed the determination of the County Board to the Tax Equalization and Review Commission (the Commission).
6. A Single Commissioner hearing was held on July 27, 2016, at the Omaha State Office Building, 1313 Farnam, Room 227, Omaha, Nebraska, before Commissioner Steven A. Keetle.
7. Steve A. Drzaic was present at the hearing (the Taxpayer).
8. Jackie Morhead and Sheila Carnes of the Sarpy County Assessor’s Office were present for the County Board.

Applicable Law

9. All real property in Nebraska subject to taxation shall be assessed as of the effective date of January 1.¹
10. The Commission’s review of the determination of the County Board of Equalization is de novo.²
11. When considering an appeal a presumption exists that the “board of equalization has faithfully performed its official duties in making an assessment and has acted upon sufficient competent evidence to justify its action.”³ That presumption “remains until

there is competent evidence to the contrary presented, and the presumption disappears when there is competent evidence adduced on appeal to the contrary. From that point forward, the reasonableness of the valuation fixed by the board of equalization becomes one of fact based upon all the evidence presented. The burden of showing such valuation to be unreasonable rests upon the taxpayer on appeal from the action of the board.”⁴

12. The order, decision, determination or action appealed from shall be affirmed unless evidence is adduced establishing that the order, decision, determination, or action was unreasonable or arbitrary.⁵
13. Proof that the order, decision, determination, or action was unreasonable or arbitrary must be made by clear and convincing evidence.⁶
14. A Taxpayer must introduce competent evidence of actual value of the Subject Property in order to successfully claim that the Subject Property is overvalued.⁷
15. The Commission’s Decision and Order shall include findings of fact and conclusions of law.⁸

Findings of Fact & Conclusions of Law

16. The Taxpayer alleged that the assessed value of the Subject Property was not uniform and proportionate when compared to the assessed values of other houses in the area.
17. The Taxpayer specifically referred to the neighbor’s home located at 7327 S. 93rd Street (the Neighbor’s House) as being comparable to the Subject Property, but with a lower assessed value for tax year 2015.
18. The County presented the property record files for several properties located in the Subject Property’s subdivision, including the Neighbor’s House.
19. The property record files indicate that the Neighbors House has a lower quality rating than the Subject Property.
20. Comparable properties share similar use (residential, commercial industrial, or agricultural), physical characteristics (size, shape, and topography), and location.⁹
21. A further review of the property record cards for properties in the Subject Property’s subdivision indicate that differences in assessed values are accounted for in differences in physical characteristics (i.e. quality, condition, age, square footage, garages, etc).

22. The Taxpayer alleged that the value of the Subject Property should be lower because it backed up to an older neighborhood which contained smaller houses than those in the Subject Property's neighborhood.
23. The County provided a list of the assessment to sales ratios for all sold properties in the Taxpayer's subdivision with the ratios for properties located next to an older subdivision pulled out. These sales indicate that adjoining an older subdivision does not have a quantifiable impact on the sales prices of these properties.
24. The Taxpayer did not offer any other information to quantify the impact of the Subject Property's location adjoining an older neighborhood on its value.
25. The Taxpayer has not produced competent evidence that the County Board failed to faithfully perform its duties and to act on sufficient competent evidence to justify its actions.
26. The Taxpayer has not adduced clear and convincing evidence that the determination of the County Board is arbitrary or unreasonable and the decision of the County Board should be affirmed.

ORDER

IT IS ORDERED THAT:

1. The Decision of the County Board of Equalization determining the taxable value of the Subject Property for tax year 2015 is Affirmed.
2. The taxable value of the Subject Property for tax year 2015 is:

Land	\$ 36,000
<u>Improvements</u>	<u>\$191,821</u>
Total	\$227,821

3. This Decision and Order, if no further action is taken, shall be certified to the Sarpy County Treasurer and the Sarpy County Assessor, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §77-5018 (2014 Cum. Supp.).
4. Any request for relief, by any party, which is not specifically provided for by this Decision and Order is denied.
5. Each Party is to bear its own costs in this proceeding.
6. This Decision and Order shall only be applicable to tax year 2015.
7. This Decision and Order is effective on October 20, 2016.
